Ohio Multi-Jurisdictional Law Enforcement Task Force 2009 Data

#### Background

In 2009, there were 27 Multi-jurisdictional Law Enforcement Task Forces in the State of Ohio funded through the JAG/Byrne grant program. As a requirement of the grant, these task forces submitted performance data to OCJS corresponding to two reporting periods: January 1, 2009-June 30, 2009, and July 1, 2009-December 31, 2009. The task forces achieved 100 percent performance data reporting.

### **Investigations and Arrests**

#### New cases initiated

Ohio's 27 task forces initiated a total of 8,200 cases in 2009.

- 6,922 non-pharmaceutical drug cases initiated
- 1,278 pharmaceutical drug cases initiated

### Arrests and investigations

The task forces made a total of 4,849 arrests in 2009.

- 3,893 non-pharmaceutical drug arrests
- 475 pharmaceutical drug arrests
- 481 non-drug arrests

Of the 3,893 non-pharmaceutical drug arrests, 50 percent were for drug trafficking, and 37 percent were for drug possession.

The following table specifies the number of arrestees by type of drug and type of crime. Note that unlike the data provided above on arrests, the hierarchy rule WAS NOT used in the following table (i.e., the table includes all drugs for which the defendant was arrested); thus, the number of arrests in the table is higher than that reported above.

### Non-pharmaceutical drug crime arrestees

Task forces provided the following data on arrestees for which they had demographic information.

- 66 percent of arrestees were Caucasian, and 30 percent were African-American
- 76 percent of arrestees were male
- 348 arrestees were under age 18 at time of arrest

Criminal histories of arrestees reveal prior arrests for drug crimes, property crimes, and violent crimes.

- 1,751 arrestees had a prior drug offense arrest
- 639 arrestees had a prior property offense arrest
- 714 arrestees had a prior violent offense arrest

## Arrests by felony level

Ohio's task forces made 4,445 felony-level arrests in 2009.

- 63 percent of non-pharmaceutical drug offense arrests were Felony 4 and 5, compared to 75 percent of pharmaceutical drug offense arrests
- The percentage of Felony 1 pharmaceutical drug offense arrests was low compared to Felony 1 non-pharmaceutical drug offenses arrests, but the percentage of Felony 4 pharmaceutical arrests was higher than nonpharmaceutical Felony 4 arrests.

## **Drugs Seized and Diverted, Weapons Confiscated**

### Non-pharmaceutical drugs removed

During 2009, Ohio's drug task forces removed significant quantities of non-pharmaceutical drugs, including cocaine, crack, heroin, and marijuana.

• Cocaine: 244,104 grams

• Crack: 7,186 grams

• Heroin: 16,107 grams; 375 bundles; 2,874 dosage units

• Marijuana: 25,931 pounds (processed); 10,990 plants

• LSD: 2,819 dosage units

• Ecstasy: 216,098 dosage units; 71 grams

• Methamphetamine: 3,362 grams

• Psilocybin mushrooms: 1,335 mushrooms; 1,943 grams

### Pharmaceutical drugs seized and diverted

Task forces seized 19,872 dosage units of pharmaceutical drugs and diverted 115,776 dosage units. The category "Percocet/Percodan/Tylox/Oxycontin" constituted the largest number of seized and diverted pharmaceutical drugs.

The following table identifies the most frequently sought-after pharmaceutical drugs.

# Weapons confiscated

Firearms were the most common weapon confiscated by the task forces, making up 95 percent of all weapons confiscated.

- 51 percent of firearms confiscated were rifles/shotguns, and 49 percent of were handguns.
- Two fully automatic weapons were confiscated

### **Other Task Force Activities**

## Gang cases

Two task forces reported having a specialized gang unit. These two task forces provided intensive trainings on gangs to 24 officers.

Five task forces reported initiating 13 gang-related cases, making 100 arrests and having 46 successful prosecutions in 2009.

Four task forces subscribed to a gang-related intelligence system during one or both reporting periods in 2009.
